On August 25, 2021 educators from all across Ontario gathered together virtually with Learning Forward Ontario to hear Dr. Kathleen Gould Lundy speak and discuss how literacy programs have the ability to impact both the hearts and the minds of students.

As we discussed this powerful reminder that engagement comes before comprehension. A powerful way to engage students is to use stories as strong literacy influencers. How are we listening to the stories of our students, teachers, parents and community members? How can we use the stories from the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, Black Lives Matter, and more to influence classroom literacy? As Dr. Lundy showed us, it is rooted in giving ourselves the time and permission to allow these experiences into the classroom.

Moving forward in literacy means finding students' voices and learning from them, situating our own privilege and not judging students until we understand them. School is a difficult place for many students to be, but this shouldn't have to be the case. Powerful literacy is also about listening more than we speak, hearing what is said and what is unsaid, listening despite our own biases. Listening without judgment or defensiveness.

One thing is for certain, It is essential to find those who are going to challenge you and centre literacy in everything you do as educators. We understood that teaching literacy is very difficult and complicated to do well, and her quote from Wendell Barry deeply resonated with us:

"It may be that when we no longer know what to do, we have come to our real work and when we no longer know which way to go, we have begun our real journey. The mind that is not baffled is not employed. The impeded stream is the one that sings."

This quote also allowed us to feel vulnerable, and reminded us to take the time to check our own biases and those of our students.

After this powerful talk, participants had the opportunity to network with colleagues across the province to discuss topics of interest in literacy. We look forward to Session #2 on October 27th with Dr. Jenny Kay Dupuis!
